	A discussion took place around the Hearing Aid Services action and the committee decided that they would also like this to be a priority of work for 2023/24 work. AH would like to be involved in the ear care project.

	AH commented that it was agreed in the past that Healthwatch staff would provide support to the committee. Also complete the chair will contact non-attenders section.	
6	Care Home Project	
	AL presented her update report on the project that had been sent out with the agenda.	
	A lively discussion took place.	
	Some of the concerns that are coming from the visit are difficulty accessing services such as speech and language. Assessments are being completed via zoom which is taking care home staff one to two hours to complete the assessment with the speech and language staff. This is causing much anxiety among staff.	
	MH commented that, in her personal and professional opinion, as a retired Speech & Language Therapist, the situation is unsatisfactory. Questions to be asked could includeIs there evidence of an increase in episodes of choking and/ or aspiration (fluids entering the airway)	

and / or an increase in related medical interventions or hospital admissions?

Are care home staff becoming more risk averse therefore 'downgrading' residents diet / fluid textures/consistencies? and/ or requesting reassessment. This could be considered as detrimental to the individual resident.

Has there been an increase in re-referrals?

AL commented that we would have to talk to speech and language to get there prospective on it.

Tissue viability and dietitians no concerns.

Some concerns around continence service

Podiatry some concerns around privacy and dignity
regarding every client being in the same room having
their treatment.

There are some concerns around the safeguarding process to hospitals from the care homes. The care homes receive no response from the hospital. Some care homes are commenting what's the point in raising these concerns if we do not get a response from the hospital.

AL commented that this should be taken back to the safeguarding board

MS commented that should this not go back to the hospital

AL commented that the Team Manger sits on the Safeguarding Board.

AA commented that EC HWWL volunteer sits on the Safeguarding Board.

AL also commented that the communication between the hospital and the care homes is lacking. Especially when you are trying to find out how your resident is. This could be whilst they are in AE or the ward. Some residents do not have any relatives, but the care home staff find it difficult to get any information.

Some concerns around mental health practitioners in the reduction of face-to-face contact and their assessments Later Life Memory services no face-to-face assessment

AL commented that the Activity Co-ordinator's are struggling to get people to come to the home e.g., singers or pantomime as they would have to wear masks.

A local MP had been visiting the home and had commented that the residents couldn't understand him as he was wearing a mask and he was going to take this to parliament around the mask wearing going into care homes.

We have found the care home staff very caring.

AL reported that she had contacted more homes and after repeated requests she hadn't heard from them. If we continue to have people who don't want to engage should we undertake an enter and view.

JD also commented that she had tried several care homes herself with no response

7. Reports from HWWL reps on meetings

Carers Network

CJ reported that she had attended the Carers Network meeting which is chaired by Mary Davis from adult social care services.

Some events that have taken place were the

- Carers rights day on the 24th of November and they had two drop-in sessions at the Wigan Life Centre.
- Carers film club at spinners mill and they want to promote this service more.
- The network also wants to support carers with information and have the information sources more joined up. There's lots of different pockets of information.
- Carers Centre has a drop in on the first Monday of every month until 7:00 PM. They also have a laptop for carers scheme for unpaid carers which are refurbished by the council, but you do have

to be a registered carer to be able to get one of these laptops

- Carers are entitled to obtain COVID and flu vaccinations.
- There is an app being developed by social services to record memories of people who have a diagnosis of dementia.
- CJ had also met with Mary Davies who is working on a piece of work to improve sign posting
- Discharge into care homes is a problem. Looking at lived experience

AL commented that she had a story and would share with CJ outside the meeting

JD Thanked CJ for all the work that she is doing with the Carers Strategic Board and Carers Network
